The McGowan Labor Government is focused on creating jobs, repairing the State's finances and **supporting the ongoing recovery in the Western Australian economy.**

THE STATE OF THE WA ECONOMY

- Western Australia's economy continues to grow, with Gross State Product expected to increase by 2% in 2018-19.
- This is despite a deterioration in the global and national economic outlook. The IMF recently downgraded global growth forecasts, and household consumption and dwelling investment have been impacted nationally by tighter access to credit and falling house prices in response to the Banking Royal Commission.
- The McGowan Government has responded with its **Keystart stimulus package** to support home ownership and jobs in the construction sector and the **lowest increases to household charges in 13 years**.
- Growth in GSP is expected to accelerate to 3.5% in 2019-20, and 3% in 2020-21 onward, with further growth in exports and the domestic economy becoming the major driver of growth.
- A substantial lift in business investment is expected for the first time in seven years in 2019-20.
- This plus the McGowan Government's increased investment in **METRONET and road projects** are expected to support employment growth.
- A stronger labour market, increased population growth and improved consumer confidence are expected to underpin a lift in household consumption and dwelling investment.
- The continued growth of the WA economy in a challenging economic environment is a sign of our growing resilience and diversification, with the McGowan Government funding key areas to help continue to diversity our economy


GROSS STATE PRODUCT


Western Australia, Annual Growth

Western Australia, Annual Levels






EMPLOYMENT

- Around **37,000 jobs have been created** in Western Australia since March 2017, including 27,000 full-time jobs.
- The rebound in business investment as spending on a new wave of resource sector projects gathers pace, coupled with Government investment in major road and rail infrastructure, is expected to see employment growth of 1.75% in 2019-20, up from an estimated 1% in 2018-19.
- In 2019-20, a further 23,500 jobs are expected to be created.
- Across the forward estimates period, employment growth is expected to be further supported by an increase in residential construction activity as housing supply tightens and population growth drives demand for new housing.

■ The Government is focussed and is on track to achieve its target to create an additional 150,000 jobs by 2023-24. Treasury modelling suggests the target will require an increase in annual employment growth from 1.1% currently to 1.8% to 2023-24. This compares to long-run annual average employment growth in Western Australia (since 1989-90) of 2.1%.

METRONET:

The State Budget includes a record \$4.1 billion investment in job-creating METRONET projects.

- \$536m to build the Thornlie-Cockburn Link, with construction expected to start later this year
- \$520m to build the Yanchep Rail extension, with construction expected to start later this year
- \$146m to build the new Bayswater Station, the first stage of the Morley-Ellenbrook Line, with construction expected to start later this year
- \$207.5m over the forward estimates to remove level crossings on the Armadale Line at Oats Street, Mint Street and Welshpool Road
- \$1.2b allocation for projects in detailed planning stages, including the Byford Rail Extension, Morley-Ellenbrook Line, Midland Station Project and new Karnup Station

INVESTING IN JOB-CREATING INFRASTRUCTURE:

The McGowan Government is putting Western Australians to work through a significant investment in infrastructure throughout WA.


The Budget includes a \$4.2 billion investment in upgrades to roads, including more than \$2 billion on building, upgrading and maintaining roads in regional WA.

- \$1.2 billion for the Tonkin Highway Transformation Project
- \$852 million for the Bunbury Outer Ring Road
- \$310 million for the ongoing construction of Karratha-Tom Price Road
- \$275 million for Great Northern Highway Bindoon Bypass
- \$230 million for the Fremantle Traffic Bridge replacement project
- \$180 million for the Great Eastern Highway Bypass grade separated interchanges at Roe Highway and Abernethy Road
- \$175 million for the Albany Ring Road
- \$87.5 million to upgrade Great Northern Highway from Broome to Kununurra

The McGowan Government's Two-Year Action Plan for tourism is working, with the latest figures showing the highest international and interstate visitor numbers on record





- \$12 million in new funding for international destination marketing


STATE FINANCES AT A GLANCE

- Budget returns to general government operating surplus of \$553 million in 2018-19. WA's first surplus in five years, in just the second year of the McGowan Labor Government
- Massive turnaround from \$2.5 billion deficit in the final year of the Liberal National Government
- \$1.5 billion forecast surplus in 2019-20, rising to over \$2 billion from 2020-21 to 2022-23
- Expense growth limited to just 1.3% per annum over the four years to 2022-23, compared to 6.4% average growth under the previous Government
- Debt **\$4.1 billion lower than projected under the previous Government** by 2019-20, saving Western Australians \$508 million in wasted interest payments
- WA is the only State forecasting net debt to decrease over the forward estimates period
- Households to benefit from the Government's disciplined financial management, with the lowest increase in household fees and charges in 13 years

BUDGET BACK IN SURPLUS

- The Government's continued financial discipline has underpinned a return to surplus in 2018-19 (\$553 million)
- Operating surpluses represent the difference between day-to-day revenue and expenses but do not include spending on asset investment
- Operating surpluses are required to fund investment in infrastructure and repay the mountain of debt left by the previous Liberal National Government
- Surpluses also provide a buffer against volatility in revenue

GENERAL GOVERNMENT NET OPERATING BALANCE




EXPENDITURE MANAGEMENT

The McGowan Government's focus on reining in expenditure growth has been the key to its financial management and debt reduction.

- Expenditure is expected to grow by just 1.3% per annum over the four years to 2022-23, compared to 6.4% under the Liberal National Government
- Successful savings measures have included voluntary targeted separations, the \$1,000 wages policy, machinery of government changes and freezing some non-salary expenditure
- Moreover, expenditure has been better targeted and prioritised to improve the quality of health care, education and community safety

GENERAL GOVERNMENT EXPENSE GROWTH




PAYING DOWN THE LIBERAL NATIONAL DEBT MOUNTAIN

The Government is delivering on its promise to pay down the mountain of debt of the previous Government, sensibly over time like a household pays down a mortgage, rather than privatising Western Power.

- Debt is projected to be \$4.1 billion lower in 2019-20 than projected under the previous Government in the 2016-17 Pre-election Financial Projections Statement
- This will save Western Australians an estimated \$508 million in interest payments, which can be directed towards essential services
- Debt is forecast to decline from 2020-21. WA is the only State where debt is expected to decline

RECORD LOW INCREASE IN HOUSEHOLD FEES


The McGowan Government recognised that households have been burdened with significant increases in household charges over the last decade, averaging 5.8% per annum over the two terms of the Liberal National Government.

■ This Budget delivers the lowest increase in household fees and charges in 13 years of 2% in 2019-20

The McGowan Government ensured that households were the first to benefit from its responsible financial management.

■ Household electricity prices will rise by 1.75% in line with forecast inflation

WESTERN AUSTRALIA'S GST

The GST distribution reforms secured by the McGowan Labor Government in 2018 guarantee that WA will never again receive below 70% of our population share of the GST pool.

A GST top-up prepayment of \$434 million in 2018-19 has been fully allocated to the Government's Debt Reduction Account.

- Despite the GST reform, WA is not completely immune from movements in GST funding
- The Commonwealth has cut its estimates of the national GST pool and lowered its projections of WA's population. These effectively reduce the expected overall size of the GST pie and reduce WA's projected share of the pie. These changes are not protected by the 70% floor guarantee
- In net terms, Western Australia's **GST and floor grants are \$921 million lower** than forecast in the Budget relative to the 2018-19 Mid year Review
- Nonetheless, in a clear vindication of the McGowan Labor Government's approach to **expenditure** restraint, even without the GST floor top up payments, the Budget would still be in an operating surplus position across the entire forward estimates period



WA STATE BUDGET 2019-20 BUILDING METRONET & TRANSFORMING OUR ROADS

The McGowan Labor Government is getting things done, delivering a record investment in METRONET to create a world-class public transport network, and road infrastructure projects in Perth and the regions, creating a pipeline of jobs throughout Western Australia.

Major METRONET projects are now underway, with construction set to start on three new METRONET projects in late-2019.

The State Budget includes a record \$4.2 billion to build new road infrastructure across the metropolitan area and regional WA, with 25 major job-creating projects included in this Budget.

TRANSPORT SNAPSHOT

- \$4.1 billion allocated to METRONET projects in total over the forward estimates
- Six rail projects totalling 72km being planned or under construction
- \$415 million allocated for a boom gate blitz on the Armadale Line
- WA jobs maximised to build 246 new METRONET railcars
- More than \$2 billion being spent on regional roads
- 25 major road projects set to get underway soon
- \$146 million investment in cycling infrastructure

BUILDING METRONET & CREATING WA JOBS

More than \$1.2 billion is allocated in this Budget for METRONET projects under development, including: Byford Rail Extension, Morley-Ellenbrook Line, Midland Station Project and Karnup Station.



FORRESTFIELD-AIRPORT LINK

The \$1.9 billion project will see first trains operate in the second half of 2021, with new stations at Redcliffe, Airport Central and Forrestfield.



THORNLIE-COCKBURN LINK

The \$536 million project will extend the Thornlie Line to Cockburn Station, the first stage of a potential Circle Line, with two new stations at Nicholson Road and Ranford Road.



YANCHEP RAIL EXTENSION

The \$520 million project will extend the northern suburbs rail line to Yanchep, with three new stations at Alkimos, Eglinton and Yanchep.



MORLEY-ELLENBROOK LINE

Construction to start later this year on the **new Bayswater Station, the first stage of the Morley- Ellenbrook Line.** The new rail line will service the north eastern suburbs, with detailed planning finalised later this year.



BYFORD RAIL EXTENSION

Planning work is continuing on the project to extend the Armadale Line south to Byford.



MIDLAND STATION PROJECT

Planning work is continuing on the Midland Station Project including a new train station and line extension to Bellevue

LEVEL CROSSING REMOVAL

Construction to remove the **Denny Avenue** level crossing in Kelmscott will start later this year. \$207.5 million over the next four years to remove level crossings at **Oats Street, Mint Street** and **Welshpool Road**, plus planning underway to investigate options for **Wharf Street, Hamilton Street** and **William Street** on the Armadale Line. Further planning work underway to remove the **Caledonian Avenue** level crossing on the Midland Line.



- Construction to start on new Bellevue assembly and manufacturing facility in 2019-20
- \$1.6 billion project to deliver 246 new METRONET railcars over 10 years
- It is the largest order of railcars in WA's history
- At least 50 per cent of the manufacturing of new railcars to be completed in Western Australia

- Projects underway to close gaps on Mitchell and Kwinana Freeway Principal Shared Paths (PSPs), and along the Fremantle and Midland rail lines
- PSPs will be delivered as part of newly announced road projects, such as the replacement of the Fremantle Traffic Bridge and upgrades to Roe Highway and Tonkin Highway
- More than \$27 million will be available for the planning, design and construction of local bicycle infrastructure including safe active streets

BOOSTING MENTAL HEALTHINFRASTRUCTURE AND SERVICES

The McGowan Labor Government is delivering a record investment to mental health, alcohol and other drug services in 2019-20.

We are providing more mental health initiatives with a focus on support, education, prevention and harm reduction which are aligned to recommendations of the Sustainable Health Review and support the McGowan Government's Methamphetamine Action Plan.

- \$15.6 million for a new 20-bed secure mental health unit at Fremantle Hospital the second secure unit is expected to open in 2022 and will boost the total mental health beds on site to 84
- \$8.9 million for the continuation of the Mental Health Court Diversion program
- \$8.1 million for suicide prevention programs
- \$3.6 million towards the establishment of Recovery Colleges, an election commitment, to support individuals in self-directed recovery from mental health and alcohol related issues
- \$3 million additional funding for comprehensive planning to decommission Graylands Hospital and reconfigure mental health services to reflect contemporary and more appropriate models of care.

TACKLING THE METH CRISIS

The McGowan Government will invest an extra \$42.5 million towards its co-ordinated and integrated Methamphetamine Action Plan, **bringing the total investment to \$244.8 million to address methamphetamine issues in Western Australia.**

- \$20.1 million towards the North West Drug and Alcohol Support Program
- \$9.2 million towards the development of a comprehensive alcohol and other drug youth service in the Kimberley fulfilling an election commitment
- \$4.8 million to establish a 10-bed crisis centre in Midland
- \$2.3 million for four low medical withdrawal beds in the Kimberley
- \$914,000 for alcohol and other drug training for Aboriginal workers through the Strong Spirit Strong Mind program
- \$631,000 to expand the existing Transitional Housing and Support Program, which will assist an additional 20 people each year
- \$614,000 towards alcohol and other drug training for frontline workers such as psychologists, social workers and counsellors
- \$457,000 for the Meth Peer Education Program which focuses on harm reduction and health promotion
- \$1.52 million to expand the needle syringe exchange program in high-demand regional areas including the Great Southern and Bunbury
- \$1.05 million for alcohol and other drug education programs in schools with a focus on at-risk students
- \$300,000 to expand the Hepatitis WA nurse-led program which supports GPs to provide brief interventions to meth users
- \$200,000 towards planning for short term safe places for compulsory critical intervention
- \$200,000 to plan for the expansion of the award-winning Mental Health Police Co-Response model to regional areas and to include support for alcohol and other drug issues
- \$150,000 towards raising awareness of the community Needle Syringe Exchange Programs

Initiatives already underway as part of the government's Meth Action Plan include the establishment of the Meth Border Force, increased police roadside testing, additional treatment beds across the State, the introduction of mental health emergency centres, expanding the Mental Health Police Co-Response teams to four districts in Perth, delivery of WA's first alcohol and other drug treatment prison – with a second facility in progress, and it has also introduced the toughest penalties in Australia for meth traffickers.

COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH STEP UP/STEP DOWN SERVICES

The McGowan Government continues to increase mental health services in the community and across regional Western Australia and is investing more than \$22.4 million in capital funding over the next four years to establish community mental health step up/step down services.

This funding is in addition to almost \$6 million in 2018-19 provided for the existing step up/step down services in Joondalup (22 beds), Rockingham (10 beds) and Albany (six beds).

Community mental health step up/step down services are being established across Western Australia to support people living in the community. The service provides a range of support programs and activities within a residential style setting by offering additional support for the individual to manage a change in their mental health and being closer to the support from family and friends.

Planned community mental health step up/step down services include:

- 10-bed Bunbury service expected to open early next year
- 10-bed Kalgoorlie service expected to open next year
- A six-bed service in Broome, which is being progressed
- A six-bed service in Karratha, which is being progressed

IMPROVING AGED CARE

The McGowan Government is injecting millions of dollars towards developing, upgrading and refurbishing residential aged care facilities and tackling elder abuse.

The McGowan Labor Government is on track with its commitment to fast-tracking aged care establishments.

More than 30 aged care development opportunities have been progressed through land transfers, rezonings and development approvals.

These projects are estimated to create at least another 1,500 aged care beds across the state in coming years. An aged care working group is continuing to fast-track the availability of State-owned land and property for aged care facilities.

- An extra \$5 million for a purpose-built 38-bed residential aged and palliative care facility in Carnarvon on top of the \$11.6 million previously committed
- \$2.3 million package to combat elder abuse, including continued funding for the WA Elder Abuse Helpline
- \$8.6 million to support the Karlarra House residential aged care facility in Port Hedland

URGENT CARE CLINICS

The McGowan Government is Delivering Urgent Care Clinics to free up hospital beds and shorten emergency department waiting times – so more patients can be treated

The Government opened the first specialist Urgent Care Clinic (Toxicology), which focuses on those impacted by drugs and alcohol, at Royal Perth Hospital.

 \$2 million has been committed towards establishing Urgent Care Clinics across the community.

MEDIHOTELS

Work is underway for WA's first Medihotel.

The first Medihotel will be located alongside Fiona Stanley Hospital as part of the Murdoch Health and Knowledge Precinct, which will include aged care beds, housing and health research facilities.

Patients who are discharged from hospital but are still recovering can recuperate in a Medihotel, which offers comfort and privacy with close access to medical care.

WA STATE BUDGET 2019-20 INVESTING IN OUR CHILDREN'S EDUCATION

The McGowan Labor Government has invested in schools and Western Australia, ensuring all students – regardless of where they live – receive a high quality education. The McGowan Government is focused on ensuring schools can better support the growing numbers of students in modern, first class facilities.

The 2019-20 State Budget includes a \$452.8 million investment to improve school infrastructure and create jobs for Western Australians.

An additional \$40 million has been allocated to students with disability in public schools to 2022-23 to help address learning needs of WA students. This brings the total amount of funding in 2019 for students with eligible disability to \$326.8 million.

EDUCATION SNAPSHOT

- Total \$22.1 billion investment over four years in WA education
- \$452.8 million in 2019-20 to **build and improve WA schools** to support the growth in our suburbs and ensure our students are learning in modern environments
- \$152.8 million to build **four new primary schools** to open in 2020 and **five new primary schools** to open in 2021
- \$77.4 million to redevelop secondary schools, across Perth
- \$38.3 million of **infrastructure works** to commence at regional schools
- Additional \$40 million allocated to students with disability in WA public schools through to 2022-23 to help address learning needs of students
- Enrolment growth in WA public schools is projected to grow by 27,000 students over the four years from 2019 to 2023
- \$3 million towards science labs for 51 primary schools across the State



INVESTING IN SCHOOLS ACROSS WA

The McGowan State Budgets have made significant investment in public school infrastructure, which will ensure students across the State are learning in the best possible environments and also create jobs for Western Australians.

NEW SCHOOLS

New primary schools at a cost of \$74.5 million to open in 2020 include:

Construction at the new **Inner City College** (planning name) at Kitchener Park will continue (\$70.6 million). The school will open for the 2020 school year as a local intake secondary school.

The McGowan Labor Government has brought fresh ideas and new resources to the fight against crime. The introduction of innovative, evidence-based policies is helping make our communities stronger and safer.

There is continued focus on the problems of family and domestic violence and juvenile crime with new whole-of-government initiatives and strong support for victims.

WA STATE BUDGET 2019-20 WHERE THE MONEY COMES FROM & WHERE IT GOES

RESPONSIBLE FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT AND DELIVERING QUALITY SERVICES:

The McGowan Labor Government has turned the State's finances around, with the Budget returning to surplus in 2018-19, in just its second year in office. The operating surplus is the first in five years and shows that the Government's plan to manage the finances is working.


Operating surpluses are forecast across the entire forward estimates period, including a \$1.5 billion surplus in 2019-20, and surpluses over \$2 billion until 2022-23. The surpluses are underpinned by the Government's disciplined control of general government expenses, which are projected to increase by just 1.5% in 2019-20, and by an average of 1.3% per annum over the forward estimates period.


REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE AT A GLANCE

- Revenue is estimated to total \$31.3 billion in 2019-20, with 66% generated directly by the State.
- GST revenue (including top up grants) and other Commonwealth grants represent 34% of the State's total revenue, the lowest proportion of any State.
- Expenses are forecast to total \$29.8 billion in 2019-20, with over two thirds of this budgeted for the key priority areas of health, education, community support and safety.
- The State is forecast to keep expenses lower than revenue in each year from 2018-19 onwards, **creating** operating surpluses in each year.
- Surpluses provide funds for new infrastructure and to pay down the high levels of debt inherited from the previous Liberal National Government.

INTERJURISDICTIONAL COMPARISON

Western Australia generates 66% of its revenue from direct State sources, with only 34% being provided by the Commonwealth. This is the highest proportion of own-source revenue of any State.

The State Budget includes important initiatives to protect Western Australia's unique natural environment while creating opportunities for jobs and tourism.

The McGowan Labor Government is committed to reducing waste and has implemented key strategies including a ban on single-use plastic bags and a new Container Deposit Scheme which will improve recycling to reduce the significant impact on our environment.

PLAN FOR OUR PARKS

- More than \$22 million extra to support the Plan for our Parks initiative
- On top of more than \$100 million already earmarked for visitor services and public programs provided in national parks and other lands and waters for 2019-20
- Ambitious plan to create five million hectares of new national and marine parks and conservation reserves will be delivered over the next five years
- \$10 million to establish visitor operations and infrastructure at the proposed Houtman Abrolhos Islands National Park, with an additional \$3.8 million for ongoing management of the islands
- \$6.7 million to build public recreation facilities and implement traditional owner joint management of coastal reserves in the Ningaloo Coast World Heritage Area

CONTAINER DEPOSIT SCHEME

The State Budget includes \$4.44 million to begin implementing the McGowan Government's Container Deposit Scheme, which is expected to begin in 2020.

The Scheme will offer consumers a **10 cent refund when they return eligible bottles and cans** to refund points across the State.

Over the next 20 years, the State-wide scheme is predicted to reduce littered containers by 706 million, cut the number of containers sent to landfill by 6.6 billion and see an increase in recycled containers of 5.9 billion.

As well as diverting waste from landfill, the scheme will **boost employment and create hundreds of jobs at new container sorting and processing facilities**, and refund points across metropolitan and regional Western Australia.
