- Additional \$17 million to regional youth justice services in the Kimberley and Pilbara
- \$10 million towards the Port Hedland Sporting and Community Hub
- \$14 million to continue the Aboriginal Community Connectors program, including in Hedland and Roebourne
- \$10 million to the new Club Night Lights program for floodlighting on community facilities
- \$12 million for the Seniors Safety and Security Rebates
