

Delivering our Vision for the Wheatbelt

The Cook Labor Government is delivering its vision for the Wheatbelt.

The 2025-26 Budget will see billions of dollars invested in our regions, driving economic growth, diversifying regional economies, and creating jobs for our future generations.

This funding investment is supporting the Cook Government's priorities in jobs, health and housing. It is a commitment to Western Australians – that no matter if they live in our suburbs, regional centres, towns, or remote communities – they will have local job opportunities, and access to major services and infrastructure.

The Budget will keep costs down for WA families with funding to roll out the second wave of the WA Student Assistance Payment putting hundreds of dollars into the pockets of families of school-aged children, and household fees and charges kept affordable, with below inflation increases for a sixth consecutive year.

More than \$4 billion in Royalties for Regions funding will also go towards projects which enhance regional communities, ensuring they remain exceptional places to live, work and raise a family.

Made in WA

- \$8.3 million to progress planning and negotiations to bring the Freight Rail Network back into Government hands.
- \$543 million to upgrade the Goldfields and Agricultural Water Supply Scheme to increase capacity that will improve supply reliability for the community while supporting immediate growth in mining, industry and the community more broadly.
- \$20 million to expand the **Aboriginal Ranger Program**.
- \$50 million Battery Manufacturing Program to support local businesses to make household batteries here in WA.

Plus we are continuing to deliver:

\$424 million to deliver the King Rocks Wind Farm.

Supporting WA Families

- \$88.7 million in cost of living relief to families for school expenses, including \$250 for every secondary student and \$150 for every primary and kindergarten student, through the second round of the Western Australian Student Assistance Payment.
- \$25.7 million to deliver a further \$100 increase to the Regional Pensioner Travel Card, bringing the total card value to \$775 per year.

- \$18 million to halve TransWA fares for bus services connecting towns in regional WA, including across the Wheatbelt.
- \$8 million for the Country Week Assistance Program, reducing travel and accommodation costs for families.
- \$337 million towards the WA Residential Battery Scheme, which combined with the Commonwealth scheme, provides, Synergy customers with up to \$5,000 and Horizon Power customers with up to \$7,500 towards the cost of a household battery, plus households with incomes of less than \$210,000 per annum can access no-interest loans of up to \$10,000.
- \$3.5 billion over the next four years to keep regional water and power prices in line with metropolitan prices.

Ensuring Everyone Has a Home

- \$25 million over four years for the **Regional Housing Support Fund** which will provide grants of up to \$5 million to support new housing and land supply across regional WA, supporting regional subdivision and key worker and community housing projects.
- \$103.8 million to double the Government Regional Officer Housing (GROH) construction program with over 100 new builds, plus land acquisition, across regional WA to support key government workers such as police and teachers.
- Delivering through Keystart, a new low-deposit modular home loan product to assist more people, particularly in regional WA, to purchase a modular home.

Plus we are continuing to deliver:

 Increased stamp duty threshold for first homebuyers to \$500,000, with discounted rates applied to homes valued up to \$750,000 in regional WA.

Becoming the Healthiest State in the Nation

- \$18.5 million to increase the **Patient Assisted Travel Scheme** (PATS) fuel subsidy from 26c per kilometre to 40c per kilometre.
- \$12.2 million towards the Virtual Infant Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service Hub, providing specialist mental healthcare for children and young people via telehealth.
- \$8.2 million to establish GP ASK to connect WA GP's to dedicated and experienced specialists without the need for patients to travel to a hospital.

Growing a Skilled Workforce

- \$43.3 million for the first tranche of funding to the Cool the Schools program that will deliver air conditioning upgrades at schools across the State including:
 - **\$1.1** million to deliver air conditioning upgrades at **Bindoon Primary School**.
 - **•** \$680,000 to upgrade air conditioning at **Mukinbudin District High School**.
- \$30.3 million for the School of Isolated and Distance Education to support more students learning in regional Western Australia.

- \$15 million to **boost Before and After School Care** in schools.
- \$28 million to expand the School Breakfast Program to provide free breakfasts five days a week at more than 650 schools, including in the Wheatbelt.
- \$10 million to establish a program to boost capacity in **public school canteens** through grants for canteen staff, equipment and minor facility upgrades.
- \$8.6 million to expand fee-free TAFE in the regions with an additional seven construction courses fee-free from 2026.
- **\$100 million to keep TAFE course fees unchanged** in 2026.
- \$11.6 million for another round of the TAFE Modern Equipment program to upgrade TAFE equipment across regional WA.

Plus we are continuing to deliver:

- \$1.7 million for upgrades to **Newdegate Primary School.**
- \$1.5 million for upgrades to **Gingin District High School**.

Transport and Infrastructure

- \$25 million towards the Northam Pithara Road realignment and bridge replacement project to increase safety for road users.
- \$250 million to expand the **Regional Road Safety program** to include local government roads, delivering road safety treatments including sealing of road shoulders and the installation of audible lines, making more regional roads safer.

Building Safer and Stronger Communities

- \$15.6 million to redevelop accommodation at the WA Police Academy to provide free residential accommodation for regional police recruits during the six-month training period, with the option for them to be placed in their home policing districts for the first four to six years of their careers.
- \$6.7 million to support DFES aerial fire response capability and establish two strike teams to mitigate the threat of crop fires during the grain harvesting season.
- \$3.5 million for expansion of the Community Emergency Services Manager program with six new positions across regional WA, to help local governments deliver emergency management services.
- \$3.1 million towards a new State Bushfire Mitigation Branch to undertake mitigation works on Unallocated Crown Land and Unmanaged Reserves.
- \$3 million to continue an uplift in baseline funding to financial counselling services across the State, including the Share and Care Wheatbelt Financial Counselling Service and the Narrogin Financial Counselling Service.

Growing Regional Sport and Communities

- \$1.2 million to upgrades at the Hurricane Go Kart Club in Wundowie including track extension and resurfacing, medical facilities and other infrastructure improvements.
- \$100,000 for medical facilities at Lake King Kart Club.
- \$25.2 million to the **Regional Racing Fund** to upgrade infrastructure at regional racing clubs across the State including:
 - **\$500,000 for upgrades at Narrogin Race and Pace Club**.
 - \$420,000 for upgrades at **Wagin Trotting Club**.
 - **\$332,000 for upgrades at Northam Harness Club**.
 - \$315,000 for upgrades at Northam Race Club.
 - **\$30,000 for upgrades at York Racing Club**.
- \$6 million to establish the Boosting Women and Girls Participation in Sport fund to encourage women and girls to get involved in community sport.
- \$4 million to establish the Veterans Facilities fund to help RSL and veterans organisations upgrade their local facilities and RSL clubs.
